Each summer, Heart and Hand House facilitates the completion of critical home repairs for low-income, Barbour County families to improve the quality and safety of their living conditions. Between 15-18 volunteer work teams are involved in the projects, which may include, but are not limited to: roof replacement or repair to eliminate leaking and related home damage; repair or replacement of damaged flooring to eliminate safety hazards; plumbing installation or repairs to enable running water in the home; electrical work to repair unsafe wiring or to connect power to the home; and installation of wheelchair ramps and other accessibility features to accommodate household members with disabilities. In addition to the repair projects, our volunteer teams generally construct one new home per year or build substantial additions onto existing structures to accommodate growing families and eliminate overcrowding.

The Apollo Youth Theatre Company Workshops expose students to all aspects of the theatre. Our programs are comprised of a Summer Workshop for 4th through 12th grade, Fall and Winter Workshops comprised of a "Junior" Program 4th through the 12th grade and "Just for Kids" Program K through the 5th grade. The process begins with an audition workshop and culminates with a live theatrical presentation open to the public. During our programs, each child learns to operate as a team in set construction, costuming, make-up, singing, dancing and oral dictation. Students participate in various workshops, depending on the show, where they learn theatre games that encourage self-confidence and artistic expression. To expose additional youth to the arts, during the school year we offer field trips at a discounted rate to area schools, free seats to the Boys and Girls Club, and other entities that reach out with need and in the summer to area community centers and Parks and Recreation Camp. This part of our program allows our youth to perform in front of their peers, which both instills confidence in our cast and also inspires their peers as well. Not only does it expose more of the area youth to theatre, some for the first time, but it also exposes them to a historic building. This year the 2024 Summer Program marks our 40th year and is being presented as a collaboration between the For the Kids, by George Children's Museum, the Martinsburg Round House, and the Apollo Civic Theatre. The NIP's program allows us to offer more scholarships/tuition assistance for those in need and allows us to continue to provide tickets at a discount and for free to more programs like the Parks and Recreation Caps, area schools, daycares, the boys and Girls Club, scout troops and the Children's Home Society of West Virginia, and more.

Youth ages 6 - 18 in Berkeley, Jefferson, and Morgan counties are the future of the Eastern Panhandle and the state of West Virginia. When our community members invest in them, they are investing in the future. Programs provided by the Boys & Girls Club are an important component of that investment. In 2023, 60% of youth served by the Boys & Girls Club of the Eastern Panhandle (BGCEP) reported coming from low -income families, so ensuring they receive the academic and social support they need to succeed in school and life is essential. This is accomplished by providing programs that address five focus areas: education and career; character and leadership; health and life skills; the arts; and sports, fitness, and recreation. Additionally, the Boys & Girls of the Eastern Panhandle provides a snack and dinner every day of the after school program and a lunch and snack during the summer program. Mentoring is the thread that runs through all of these programs, and research demonstrates that supportive, healthy relationships formed between mentors and mentees contribute to a host of benefits, including increased high school graduation rates, lower high school dropout rates, better attitudes about school, higher college enrollment rates, and enhanced self-esteem and self-confidence. Mentoring Matters Most (Triple M) is the foundation of all programming at the Boys & Girls Club of the Eastern Panhandle. Mentoring services are provided by professional staff and volunteers to ensure that every young person who attends the Club receives personal attention. Mentor/mentee interactions are documented in an online system on a weekly basis. These services can't be provided for free. Since Triple M is incorporated into all BGCEP programming, donations are used to cover the \$1,000 gap between fees, other funding sources, and the actual cost of delivering services, which is y \$3,200 per child per year.

West Virginia faces the highest per capita rate of children in foster care, according to the Annie E. Casey Foundation. This is particularly evident in Berkeley, Jefferson, and Morgan counties of the Eastern Panhandle, where nearly 800 children aged 0-18 are removed from their homes due to abuse and neglect. The shortage of foster families compounds the challenges these vulnerable children endure, often resulting in distant placements due to local capacity limits. Child welfare professionals prioritize kinship placements to minimize trauma and maintain familial and cultural ties, as they offer the best environment for overall well-being. However, many kinship caregivers lack adequate support and resources, hampering their ability to meet placement criteria and provide necessary care. Insufficient resources exacerbate stress and hinder long-term placement success. CASA-EP addresses these pressing issues through the "Make it Happen" Fund, establishing emergency resources to assist families or close family friends in meeting state requirements for kinship placements. This fund swiftly provides essential items and services, reducing the need for foster care. Provisions often include but are not limited to beds, car seats, household supplies, diapers, clothing, transportation, and medical supplies. Experts universally advocate for familial settings, within the child's community, as the optimal environment for the child's ability to thrive, be it through relatives or foster homes, as opposed to institutional settings. In the event a child is institutionalized or placed in a group setting, they often have no one to offer assistance with items needed. CASA-EP also utilizes these funds to ensure the child has the necessary items for comfort and security in an unfamiliar setting. This includes providing essential items to enhance the child's well-being and ease their transition, such as bedding, personal belongings, and other comforting items.

The Habitat for Humanity of the Eastern Panhandle Safe, Affordable Housing Program provides affordable, accessible, durable and sustainable housing opportunities for low-income individuals and families in Berkeley, Jefferson and Morgan counties in the Eastern Panhandle of WV. Income guidelines are based on HUD's income limits at the time of application with most partner families being at or below 60% of the median family income. New homes are constructed on lots owned by Habitat for Humanity of the Eastern Panhandle (HFHEP) and then sold to an eligible partner family through a zero-interest loan. The loan amount is such that a families' mortgage payment including taxes and insurance does not exceed 30% of their income. Partner families must complete sweat equity during the construction of the home as their contribution to the partnership with HFHEP. The program also provides small exterior repair services to income eligible residents of owner-occupied housing who are willing and able to partner with HFHEP, able to make any required payments, and can demonstrate the need for the repairs. The scope of work for these projects may include painting, landscaping, decking/porch repair, and other small exterior work needed to preserve the integrity and safety of the house. Funding raised through the NIP Tax Credit Award will be utilized to purchase materials, building sites, and other supplies necessary for completing project objectives. Whether it be a repair or new construction, each project taken-on under the HFHEP Safe, Affordable Housing Program aims to create a safe, healthy, energy efficient environment for the partner families to call home. Together with community volunteers and donors, we assist partner families in building strength, stability, self-reliance, and shelter.

Morgan County Starting Points Family Support Center, a department of Shenandoah Valley Medical System, Inc. will utilize NIP credits proceeds to alleviate food insecurities throughout Morgan County. A school backpack program, Community Kitchen, free pop-up farmers markets, and school and community nutrition programs, teach as well as feed those struggling with food resources. Our experience has been that NIP credits allow us to maximize the financial contributions from current donors and attract new donors who are drawn to Starting Points' role in addressing community needs. Starting Points facilitates the Meal Time Community Kitchen (MTCK) which provides free hot meals three evenings a week; the Morgan County Backpack Program which distributes weekly meal bags to an average of 230 children pre-k through grade 12; with produce gleaned from the local Farmers Market, free pop-up markets are offered during the summer months in Paw Paw and at the MTCK. Paw Paw, a small community in the western area of Morgan County, continues to meet the USDA criteria of a food desert. There are limited food and fresh produce resources available within 45-minute drive. Starting Points, while serving all of Morgan County, continues to pour extra resources into this community with a bi-monthly mobile pantry from Mountaineer Food Bank and a new partnership with Community Markets, Inc. that will offer quarterly food boxes to 150 Paw Paw area families. Starting Points also provides monthly food/hygiene/cleaning supply boxes to 20 area families who are at or below the 125% poverty level. Nutrition Education is also a focus, encouraging families to make healthy food choices/purchases, how to prepare the fresh produce and how to grow their own food. A monthly Cheap Eats program in Paw Paw and county wide school-based programs provide information on meal preparation, and recipe repairs with healthier ingredient substitutions and shopping on a budget.

This is done through a school-based mentoring program, a community-based program, high school mentoring programs, and corporate mentoring programs. Volunteers spend one-on-one quality time with at-risk children providing mentoring and friendship. What sets our mentoring program apart from many in the country is the on-going, professionally managed support that our families, children, and mentors receive during their match. Our staff of Match Support Specialists are social workers dedicated to ensuring that all parties feel safe and comfortable with the match, have the information necessary to be successful, and have support when/if things get difficult. Monthly match support conversations include conversations around activities, interests, and outings, as well as ensuring the ongoing appropriateness of the mentoring relationship and home environment. Following these match support communications, intervention is taken when needed. In 2022 Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state expanded our services to include Putnam and Kanawha Counties. This funding request will assist with operational buildout in all five counties of our service and support growth in service during this fiscal year. While building relationships and enrolling children does take a considerable amount of our employee time, our greatest challenge at Big Brothers Big Sisters is recruiting and enrolling adult mentors. While we can't serve all kids, it is our hope to grow this program to make a substantial impact on our community. We will complete this expansion through community recruitment efforts, establishment of new corporate and community partnerships, and raising awareness of our services. The more we can enhance mentor recruitment, the more youth we can serve!

The Physical, Medical, and Transportation Services for Low Income Patients and Families was established by the Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation as a community-based assistance effort to support the needs of the most fragile and vulnerable members in the counties the hospital serves (Cabell, Wayne, Mason, Logan, Mingo, and more). This region includes some of the most highly distress neighborhoods in the state and a significant population impacted by poverty, high incidences of substance abuse, poor health practices, and inconsistent medical care. Among those served by Cabell Huntington Hospital are patients from low-income backgrounds, people and families who are homeless, victims of domestic violence or human trafficking, and those suffering with mental health and substance abuse issues. Our target is to help people who have incomes within 125 percent of the federal poverty line. This project was designed to aid to financially vulnerable patients, thus relieving stresses and worries that far too often present barriers to them seeking needed medical care. Assistance takes many forms, including covering co-pays, pharmaceuticals and medical supplies, payments for prescriptions, transportation to medical appointments (for those not eligible for other transportation services), and hotel accommodations for patients who are traveling long distances for cancer treatments. Far greater than the financial assistance, it provides a measure of hope to patients who are struggling, not only with sometimes desperate medical diagnoses, but also the uncertainty of how they will pay for care and treatment. Funds provided by NIP donations would be instrumental in bringing much needed financial assistance and the healing power of hope to hundreds of needy patients each year.

At CONTACT Rape Crisis Center, we are dedicated to providing comprehensive support to children from Cabell and Wayne counties who have experienced the trauma of sexual abuse. Our mission is to offer these young survivors and their families the compassionate care and practical assistance they need to navigate the aftermath of abuse and begin their journey toward healing. Our specially trained Child Victim Advocates play a crucial role in this process. These professionals provide emotional and practical support during forensic interviews and medical exams at the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) in Cabell Huntington Hospital. They also accompany and assist children and their non-offending caregivers as they interact with law enforcement agencies and the court system, ensuring they feel supported and understood throughout these challenging experiences. In addition to in-person support, CONTACT Rape Crisis Center offers around-the-clock assistance. Our advocates are available 24 hours a day to help with safety planning, provide counseling referrals, or simply answer questions that may arise at any time. Unfortunately, not all potential clients can get to our Boutique. Transportation in our region is a significant problem for anyone without a vehicle, with limited public transportation options, and for jobless and low-income women, or those without any income at all, it can be a tremendous barrier to accessing needed services. In many of our southern coalfield counties, support services are extremely limited, and programs to help women find and secure employment are simply nonexistent. We propose to address this issue by extending our current community outreach/mobile services program to serve Boone, Logan, Mingo, and McDowell counties, and eastern Kanawha County. Our mobile services accommodate clothing, program materials, and computers needed for resume creation, or completing online job applications and provide women with clothing for interviews and subsequent employment, workshop and program opportunities and a warm and welcoming person to guide them through the process of reclaiming a vision for their future. We currently partner with several programs in these counties currently to provide services for women who are in recovery, or formerly incarceration, but this project will help us expand on those services. Providing this type of support will help women overcome the barriers that keep them from employment and thus the ability to achieve success and self-sufficiency.

We are an after school program during the school year but we are an all day summer program each summer. We provide breakfast, a hot lunch and snacks for our members daily. In addition our programs and services are designed with the whole child in mind. Each year, approximately 500 children between the ages of 6 and 18 participate in our Power Hour Program., which is designed to include homework assistance, tutoring enrichment, educational computer programs and field trips. We design our program with field trips and experiences for our members to help them build as many connections as possible to the real world. Both club locations, B.C. McGinnis in Guyandotte and Henrietta Payne in West Huntington, are in neighborhoods with higher rates of poverty and crime, which shows the value of the clubs' purpose as shelter and a safe haven, both after school and during the summer. Caring for our members we provide support for the family when one or more parents or guardians maybe working or seeking employment. Focusing our efforts on providing shelter, food, safety, well-being, and educational advancement of our members, we hope has led and will continue to lead them to reach their full potential as productive, caring, and responsible citizens.

These families will have their individual apartments and the women will receive services including therapy, groups, education classes, peer support, case management and psychiatric medical care. Children ages 3 and up who are staying with the mother will have access Counseling, groups, case management, prevention services and mentoring. Children under age 3 will have access to WV Birth to Three services. We also have a partnership with Recovery Point to offer services to the fathers who are wanting services. The families will stay in the residential program for 3-6 months.

Tri-State Huntington Homeless Shelter Mission, Inc. developed a new initiative in 2021 "The Farmers for the Hungry." This program is based on the concept that the freshest food provides the best nutritional value and the finest people to raise such food are West Virginia farmers. This unique program was designed to provide fresh healthy grass-fed beef and produce to residents of Cabell and Wayne County experiencing food insecurity while reimbursing WV farmers using tax law and, in some instances, a micro-grant to pay the farmers 100% of what they would receive after tax for their product, selling their livestock or produce at the market. The program simply seeks to reimburse a farmer 100% of what the farmer keeps "net" money after paying tax on the beef he/she sells. After selling the farm product, like all taxpayers, a farmer is taxed with federal and state income tax. Tri-State refers to this as our "break-even point" that the program pays "net" to the farmer. Tri-State intends to use funds offered from the WV Nip Program to provide micro-grants to the farmer, as an incentive to donate their livestock to our feeding program. The availability of this program will reduce the food cost budget associated with feeding the homeless of Huntington area. Since September 2023, 21 cows have been donated to this program, and have made available 6,938 pounds of meat to those people experiencing food insecurity in our area. In 2023, our community feeding program served over 230,000 meals to people in the Huntington area experiencing homelessness and/or food insecurity. Current numbers, suggest that by the end of 2024 we will have serve very close to 250,000 meals. Farmers for the Hungry helps reduce the cost of food so we can continue to serve these populations.

Our services have become more even more intensive, focusing more on social, emotional and physical well-being rather than attendance and academics. We have adapted our program to meet the growing needs of our students through home visits, phone calls, letters home and video chats, and look to continue to adapt our program to ensure our students are safe and well.

The WVSOM Foundation will provide up to 10 scholarships of \$1,000-\$10,000 for low-income medical students from 54 high-priority counties in West Virginia who indicate they will practice medicine in the state. Priority counties include all WV counties except for Berkeley. Priority counties have a poverty level of 17.2 percent or above (average of 21.77%), median household income of \$46,683 or less (average of \$41,086), primary care provider shortage in part or all of the county and/or are designated medically underserved by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. Our project helps get physicians into rural and underserved areas by prioritizing financial assistance for students from counties with high poverty, low income, and tremendous need for medical providers. It targets students with income at or below 125% of federal poverty level or less willing to practice in West Virginia. Currently, 78% of WVSOM students are living at or below 125% of poverty level, according to FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) forms. Almost 90% of WVSOM students must borrow money (an average of \$238,000) for medical school tuition and living expenses. Accumulating that kind of debt means they are tempted to work in higher-paying medical specialties and higher-paying urban areas. By reducing their debt load, WVSOM Foundation provides financial incentives for students to practice in rural, underserved areas. We will give preference to students from the 54 high-priority counties, but scholarships may be awarded to students from West Virginia if not enough competitive applications are received from the priority group. WVSOM will give NIP credits to donors who give scholarship funds for immediate use or permanent endowments designated for scholarships.

Central WV Community Action's Pathways to Independence initiative provides emergency services to low-income Lewis County and Harrison County residents. NIP donations support customers who are experiencing financial difficulties with emergency rent or mortgage payments, utility payments, food assistance, transportation services to maintain employment, and other basic needs to avert deeper crises. Many of the agency's customers include the working poor, who live daily on the edge of being able to meet their basic needs. When income is lost due to lack of transportation, lack of available childcare, or health-related incidents, families can transition from vulnerable to in-crisis overnight. Similarly, sudden pop-up expenses, such as car repairs, the need to obtain new housing, unexpected babysitting costs, or medical/pharmacy expenses can mean the difference in paying or not paying a water bill, for example. It is the agency's goal to provide transitional financial support to ensure that families can meet their basic needs and can thrive. While NIP-related donations provide for the cost of customer supports, the agency takes a holistic approach to assess and meet each customer's needs related to their overall self-sufficiency. Customers are screened by a case manager while applying for assistance, and each customer is encouraged to deepen their financial management knowledge through individualized budgeting activities. Within the agency, customers can receive long-term case management assistance, Head Start, housing services, and employment transition support. Outside referrals are made for a host of additional services as well. The target populations for the Pathways to Independence initiative will be Harrison and Lewis County families living at or below 125% of the federal poverty guidelines.

Genesis Youth Crisis Center currently operates 3 emergency crisis shelters, all located in Clarksburg, WV. These shelters serve children ages 6-17, from all 55 WV counties. The youth we serve have all suffered some form of traumatic experience. These youth also often come to us devoid of their basic needs, sometimes with just the clothes on their backs, belongings, if any, in trash bags and no hygiene supplies. The monies raised from our NIP credit donors go directly towards maintaining what we call our "Clothing Closet". This is a dedicated room at each location where we keep needed goods, such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shampoo, conditioner, razors, shaving cream, feminine hygiene supplies, sweat pants, t-shirts, coats, sweatshirts, pajamas, flip flops, shoes, sports bras and seasonal items such as bathing suits and duffel bags. This space is set up to be "shopped" so our residents can select their own scents, colors and fabrics of their would-be items. Doing so allows them to make choices for themselves, in a time that little choice is theirs and at a time that is otherwise chaotic.

Hero's Haven Child Advocacy Center facilitates a multidisciplinary investigative team (MDIT) response to the investigation of allegations of crimes against children in Harrison, Barbour, Taylor, and Doddridge counties. Alleged crimes include, but are not limited to, sexual abuse, sexual assault, severe physical abuse and neglect, drug endangerment, depiction in pornography, child trafficking, and witness to violence (including homicide). The agency provides a physically and psychologically safe, child-friendly environment for the investigation of these allegations utilizing industry standard protocols. Certified Child Forensic Interviewers facilitate an investigative interview while law enforcement officers and other child safety professionals from various disciplines are present to view the interview in real time, working collaboratively so that the child only needs to disclose the details of the abuse once, minimizing further trauma caused by repeated questioning. Family advocates provide timely referrals for trauma-informed mental health services as well as specialized medical exams and are available to the child and their protecting caregivers for ongoing support and court accompaniment throughout any judicial response. Family Advocates on staff also assist caregivers in applying for financial support through the Crime Victim's Compensation Fund to reduce any financial burden associated with follow-up treatments. The agency facilitates monthly MDIT meetings in each of the four counties served for purposes of case review, ensuring that no case, or child, falls through cracks in the system. This quick, multidisciplinary investigative team approach provides non-duplication of many services crucial to the future health and well-being of child victims of abuse.

The Emergency Healthcare Assistance for Rural West Virginians Project aims to significantly enhance healthcare access in Doddridge and Ritchie Counties, two of West Virginia's most rural and medically underserved areas, by eliminating barriers and bringing free clinic resources closer to these communities. Community health workers (CHWs) and Local Liaisons will act as intermediaries, helping rural residents overcome personal barriers to healthcare through cultural mediation, care coordination, coaching, advocacy, and outreach. A satellite clinic will be maintained at the Doddridge County Health Department, reducing travel distances and increasing capacity in this healthcare provider shortage area (HPSA). For patients left edentulous or without teeth, prosthetic solutions will be provided to promote an enhanced sense of well-being and restore confidence in their smile. By enhancing access to primary medical care, prescription medications, oral and dental healthcare, and primary eye care, this project will help rural residents lead healthier, more productive lives and strengthen their local economies.

Since its founding, Shepherdstown Day Care's (SDC) mission has been to serve working families of the Eastern Panhandle. West Virginia social services assistance program, know as Mountain Heart, provides a subsidy to working families (families below the 125% of the federal poverty level) whose children are enrolled in our program. This gives the parents the ability to seek employment, further their education, and otherwise aid in their endeavors to further their careers. However, the subsidy does not cover the actual cost of the program. This shortfall is \$2,132 per student per year. The gap/disparity between the subsidized tuition payments and funding needed for operations grows each year. Bridging the gap and balancing SDC's budget is an on-going and ever-present challenge. Funds realized for this project will enable SDC to enroll the working poor in our educational programs, thus keeping SDC operational and our educational program strong.

In a study enacted by 21st CC in 2024, the Center is the 2nd highest performing afterschool program in the state in the areas of improved math & reading scores. Our 3 afterschool sites include Edgewood Elementary, Emmanuel Baptist Church, and Mary C. Snow Elementary. Each site serves approximately 30-35 children with the intent to expand enrollment to average 50 students served per site. All program sites operate on the Kanawha County School (KCS) academic year calendar with additional summer programming provided all day during summer recess. School year sites operate Monday through Friday, 2PM to 5:30PM. Summer session programs operate at the Emmanuel Baptist Church site, 8AM to 5:30PM, weekdays. In our program, children engage in homework assistance, academic enrichment, skill-building activities, and recreational opportunities every day. Center staff provide supervision and implement curriculum such as Positive Action for social & emotional support and the Second Step Violence Prevention program. Certified KCS teachers provide one-on-one and small group tutoring in reading and math as well as academic enrichment sessions. Opportunities for specialized activities are provided by partners such as WVSU and WVU Extension Services who provide STEM (science, tech, engineering, math) & positive youth development activities. Throughout the whole year, children are provided free, nutritious meals each day that are certified and audited by the WVDE Office of Child Nutrition. School year we provide snack and dinner while summer programs provide breakfast, lunch, and a snack. These meals are free of charge & the Center is an "open feeding site" that also serves any hungry child in need during our meals.

Since 1990, the Childhood Language Center (CLC) has helped over 2800 children with speech, language, feeding and swallowing problems. The CLC is currently assisting 75 children from 14 different WV counties and has 32 children on its waiting list. The CLC's clients are dealing with a variety of difficulties, such as Autism Spectrum Disorders, Down Syndrome, hearing impairments, developmental delays and apraxia of speech. Research has found that there is a strong connection between a child's ability to communicate and their behavior, including behavioral, emotional and social difficulties. If a child cannot communicate with his/her outside environment, this can lead to frustration and bad behavior as the child grows. It has been calculated that it costs \$2,500 to fund a child through one year of services at the CLC, which includes 50 individual therapy sessions, the opportunity to participate in group sessions and admission to the CLC's week-long summer camp. For many families in our low-income service area the CLC is the only option for speech and language therapy because it is free to any family, unlike many programs in our service area. The Sponsor A Child program allows individuals, businesses and organizations to donate \$2,500 or more in order to ensure that all children who require communication therapy have the opportunity. The donation can be either done as a lump sum or in payments as desired. No matter how the donation is given, children who would otherwise struggle to find affordable and effective speech therapy are assisted.

After the success of year one, year two of our project will now expand to 12 preschools at the request of Boone County Schools. In Boone County, only 41% of students are proficient in reading on state assessments with 69.7% identified under low socioeconomic status. This project will provide curriculum, instruction, and support to children in Preschool, Day Care, and Head Start settings. The instruction is based on Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood from Fred Rogers' landmark social-emotional learning curriculum. It will also be used to create a print rich environment to build the foundations of literacy. Children will learn a series of "strategy songs" to help manage emotions and develop key social and emotional skills while exploring, growing, and creating. Daniel Tiger's Life's Little Lessons uses the PBS Kids model of watch (video clip), play (playing games), explore (engaging in group activities), and share (communicating with families) to put children on the road to success for the future. These activities will help build phonological awareness through visual aids, books, and teacher modeling. The PBS model will allow children to strengthen their ability to comprehend, summarize, and make predictions. Each month children will be introduced to new topics that include new books, new games, open-ended discussion topics, and group activities designed specifically for their age group. Each new topic (each month) will naturally strengthen concepts of print, scribble writing, pretend read, listening, questioning, retelling, etc. Over time this flows naturally into concepts of letters, letter sounds and more complex literacy skills (phonological awareness, decoding, fluency). After each of the "Little Lessons" has been completed, each child will receive a Daniel Tiger badge on a bandana sash. Instructional support will be provided by the Education staff at West Virginia Public Broadcasting.

The Gabriel Project of WV helps babies in low-income families have a healthy, safe start in life through community-based immediate, caring assistance. Babies enter the world utterly dependent on others for their every need. For low-income families, fulfilling their baby's basic needs is a constant daily stressful struggle. Low-income families are single parent households, wed and unwed couples, teen parents without sufficient support, and in rising numbers, kinship caregivers who unexpectedly received custody of a young relative and are unprepared to meet the child's basic needs. The Gabriel Project assists these low-income families by purchasing and directly distributing formula, diapers, clothing, cribs and car seats that are cost prohibitive for impoverished families but necessities for their young child's health and well-being. We provide services according to each family's assessed needs through our network of community church sites and trained volunteers in the 28 counties of our project area. Formula, diapers and clothing are the most urgently requested basic needs. We distribute formula to families who depleted their limited monthly public nutritional assistance allocation or to families who do not qualify for public assistance yet cannot afford to adequately feed their baby. We also distribute specialized formula to low-income families whose babies have allergies, digestive problems or other medical issues. We supply diapers and infant/toddler clothing to low-income families to keep their child comfortable and to lessen health risks. The new cribs we provide give babies a safe place to sleep and reduce risks of rollover falling, positional asphyxia or other trauma. In our project area there are infants sleeping in adult beds or in wobbly strollers or baby swings because their families cannot afford a proper crib. We also distribute new car seats to secure and protect young children from death or serious injury in motor vehicle crashes or sudden stopping.

These clients are referred to us by their WV Works Program case worker. 2) Clients eligible for a vehicle through the Jobs & Hope West Virginia Program must be referred through a transition agent, be over the age of 18, and be re-entering the workforce after overcoming a personal challenge.

Heart and Hand Outreach Ministries, Inc. has assisted low-income individuals with their food, clothing, household items, furniture and utility/rent assistance needs since 1965. Our main location at 212 D Street, South Charleston, not only serves the South Charleston community, but also the nearby communities of St. Albans, Tornado, Dunbar, Institute, Alum Creek and Davis Creek. Low-income qualified individuals receive Thrift Store vouchers for free clothing, furniture and housewares. In addition, assistance is provided with our food pantry, diapers, utility/rent assistance and work boots/shoes to those who need it. Every Friday during the Kanawha County school year, fifty weekend food bags are assembled and delivered to South Charleston Middle School and distributed to students who need weekend food assistance. The HOPE Closet Program gives students access to toiletry items that they do not have at home or on a consistent basis. Each school that partners with us through the HOPE Closet Program is given a cabinet which is filled with toiletry items (shampoo, conditioner, body wash, deodorant, tampons, pads, etc) and restocked throughout the school year as needed. The goal of the HOPE Closet Program is to relieve some of the stress that students experience due to hardships or inconsistencies in their home life. It gives students access to necessities that will allow them to go to school confidently and prepared to learn. HOPE Closets also support school staff by giving them more resources to support their students. During the 2023-2024 school year we distributed 14,111 items throughout 83 schools in Kanawha, Clay, and Boone Counties. For the 2024-2025 school year we plan to expand the program to Putnam County in at least 12 more schools. Here are some stories from counselors that have a HOPE Closet in their school:"I had a student who often came, not just for herself, but for her family who was having financial problems at that time. She asked politely if she could get "extras" and I had no problem with that. To be able to supply the parents and the children with items from our closet is what it is meant for. Whatever makes the burden on the family easier, will help the student at school. It's totally a win win situation.""We have one student who is African American. Her mom struggles with finding hair products for her locally and she's a single mom from a low income home. She has appreciated the products that we've provided for her daughter. Current data shows only 40% of West Virginia students in are reading proficiently, by third grade, an important developmental threshold. Read Aloud WV is starting to track a correlation between classrooms with the most consistent Read Aloud activity and rising reading scores. Children, including low income children, can learn to read proficiently. With intentional instruction at school, and opportunities to read for fun at home, most WV children can become proficient readers by third grade, setting them up for success in school and life. Read Aloud helps children and families to nurture their reading habits. Read Aloud WV places trained volunteer readers in classrooms to serve as a "commercial" for reading, a live reading role model. Read Aloud also distributes books in communities that need them and educates parents about the value of reading to children from birth. Schools and communities most deeply involved with Read Aloud WV report higher interest in books among students and more time spent reading for pleasure. Research shows these conditions contribute to better reading comprehension and growth among children. One student in Jackson County is a perfect example. After Read Aloud WV's research-informed Summer Book Binge, designed to create excitement for reading, and to prevent summer learning loss, one elementary student held up his books, smilling from ear to ear, looked to the Read Aloud volunteer, and said "I am so happy I could cry!" His school is among several in the state where most of the students maintained, or even gained, reading proficiency during the summer.

The Religious Coalition for Community Renewal's Transitional Storage Center located within Saint Mark's United Methodist Church is a managed storage service providing 150 secure lockers and bins to people experiencing homelessness to store their personal belongings. The homeless face several barriers in trying to obtain shelter, services, and employment. Some of these obstacles are mental health and/or substance abuse problems, chronic health problems, disabilities, lack of access to transportation, and safe storage of their personal possessions. Providing a secure storage facility for the homeless helps to unlock the barriers that prevent them from obtaining permanent housing. Working with a case manager, the client, depending on the severity of the identified barriers, can expect to spend at least 3 months and up to 18 months in the program. The goal is for the client to achieve permanent housing using a Housing First approach with supportive services and collaboration among social service providers. In addition, the Transitional Storage Center offers a street outreach services to market the program, housing focused case management, and boutique where individuals experiencing homelessness may redeem vouchers for clothing.

Through this program, 75 AmeriCorps Mentors will mentor at-risk students and 8 College Ambassadors will support college access. During the 2023-24 school year, EA will continue with a pilot focused on growing professional educators within the state through the Grow Your Own (GYO) initiative. 25 high school Juniors and Seniors enrolled in their local county GYO program will provide tutoring and other instructional support to students at local elementary and middle schools. The EA program addresses the professional growth of the enrolled EA GYO students and the academic enhancement of the underserved elementary and middle school students receiving tutoring instruction from the GYO member. During the 2023-24 school year, students from 8 West Virginia counties will attend 20 or more mentoring sessions with an AmeriCorps Mentor. Members will mentor students by addressing their academic and emotional needs, helping them develop positive attitudes towards education, enhancing social skills, and encouraging skills such as time management. Mentors will continue to support at-risk students until they enroll in post-secondary education. College Ambassadors will coach high school seniors and adults by supporting the college application process. The Education Alliance has received an \$803,754 grant from Volunteer West Virginia to administer the AmeriCorps program. In order to operate the program with efficacy, the Alliance must raise \$458,007 in matching funds. The Alliance requests \$15,000 in NIP credits to assist this fundraising effort.

Many senior citizens face food insecurity in West Virginia. Nationally, 1.28 million adults age 65 or older are food insecure. West Virginia is ranked number 3 in the nation of seniors facing food insecurity. While poverty is the largest contributing factor, other issues such as mobility, transportation, and health create barriers of access to food for many seniors. The financial strain on the elderly due to inflation puts many in a difficult position of choosing to buy food or to pay for medicine and other healthcare costs. For 113 years, Union Mission has sought to feed people in need in West Virginia. There are several low income, senior living facilities in the greater Kanawha Valley. We collaborate with approximately 30 Christmas Bureau partners to provide Christmas toys and food to families while also reducing duplication of services through this collaborative effort. WV Health Right, Inc. (WVHR) is the state's oldest and largest free and charitable clinic. Since its inception in 1982, WVHR has added a variety of options to its clinical services, including health education classes, which provides tobacco cessation assistance, nutrition classes, teaching kitchen classes, and classes to help individuals manage chronic diseases such as heart disease and diabetes. In 2017, WVHR launched a state-of-the-art mobile dental clinic to provide free dental care to low-income adults in five rural counties in WV (Boone, Clay, Logan, McDowell, and Roane). Through this mobile dental clinic, WVHR will provide dental care and treatment to 1,800 impoverished uninsured/underinsured adults. In partnership with various local healthcare partners in each service area, WVHR has adequate space and internet access to perform these services. These healthcare agencies also assist in identifying residents of their area who are eligible for these free dental services. Access to dental care services improves citizens' overall health status and decreases emergency room usage, which decreases the number of controlled substances prescribed for chronic tooth pain. Further, increasing oral health care access also contributes to promoting employability and economic development and stability. In addition to providing free dental services throughout rural areas, health education materials will also be provided to 1,800 adults to increase awareness for effectively managing chronic diseases and reducing habits that lead to chronic health conditions. These materials will be geared toward managing cardiovascular risks, diabetes, weight, hypertension, and tobacco cessation.

The rent is low and paid the week. A payment plan can be tailored to the need. Food, personal supplies and transportation are also supplied to mention the most common needs. We are developing a pipeline to let organizations know this help is available and communicating the process to place individuals quickly. Failure rate is high. Second chances are important. Donations are needed.

BARC's program - Music Across the Years - provides opportunities for intergenerational group singing to families in Mercer Count using choral music to bring together students with parents, grandparents, and guardians. BARC delivers Music Across the Years in collaboration with Mercer County Schools, with which it has an ongoing and successful partnership in bringing exposure to the arts to students in schools across the county. Music Across the Years has reached students in Athens, Bluefield, Lashmeet, Matoaka, Oakvale, and Princeton since BARC and the school system began offering the program in 2022. The concept was designed by BARC in partnership with teachers and administrators. The catalyst spurring the creation of this program is the desire of the community to 1) increase participation by students in music programs and 2) further engage parents in the educational experiences of their children. Mercer County was once a commercial center for the coal and rail industries, which attracted workers from around the world. That diversity is still present in the city today. A critical component of this program is the introduction of music from these various cultures and communities to students at an early age, raising their awareness of the diversity and musical heritage of their community. Rehearsals are held at individual schools at the end of the school day. Food is provided at no charge to participants at each rehearsal. Each child also receives a free Music Across the Years shirt. Public performances are held at the historic Granada Theater which BARC owns and manages.

The Community Trust Foundation, in collaboration with the Aging and Family Services of Mineral County (AFSMC), is supporting the Meals on Wheels program in Mineral County through an established endowed fund. This endowment will assure the long-term sustainability of the Meals on Wheels program which, despite being crucial to the well-being of more and more low-income Mineral County senior citizens, continues to be increasingly underfunded. This Meals on Wheels program is a community-based, emergency assistance program that serves primarily low-income senior citizens in the economically distressed area of Mineral County, West Virginia. Meals on Wheels is a service designed to assist frail, elderly shut-ins by providing them with one well-balanced, nutritious, hot meal, five days per week. This program is for those who cannot cook for themselves, have no one to cook for them, or are unable to leave their homes for meals. The service allows people to stay in their homes, maintain some independence, and avoid living in costly institutions — a financial benefit to the client and the community. A Meals on Wheels delivery also provides a reassuring "check-in" for those who live alone. Any unanswered delivery is reported and investigated. Changes in a recipient's health or needs are noted so that dietary changes can be made or appropriate referrals to family, physician, or other community services are arranged. NIP Tax Credits to this program go to relieving the hunger deficit of needy senior citizens and assuring the long-term sustainability of this vital program. As the endowment grows in perpetuity, 4% of the market value is used by the AFSMC to assist in feeding the low-income elderly. After 10 years we expect the endowment to hold \$100,000 minimum, providing \$4000+ each year for the agency to address senior hunger and isolation.

The Christian Help (CH) direct & emergency support services are provided free-of-charge to facilitate financial stability for individuals & families in, and to avoid, crisis situations. This includes grants-in-aid; vocational assistance; daily & maternity clothes, outerwear, footwear; infant/children needs; household items, small appliances, linens; and food pantry orders. If clients have an unexpected shortage, the CH emergency financial assistance (EFA) program can help. Grants may be for identification documents critical to securing employment and benefits; or, to help pay a bill. CH EFA underwrites utilities, shelter, transportation, medical, and/or personal (e.g., birth certificates & IDs) needs. During CY23, we served 1,134 households with \$83,424 in monetary aid. Confirmation of need (i.e., billing statement, invoice) and legal right (e.g., account, vehicle, homeowner), as well as voucher acceptance from the involved vendor is required. Our network of vendors is extensive, and our reputation and payment record with them is stellar. The CH Food Pantry (FP) and Free Store (FS) programs provide direct aid via donated in-kind products to help meet client needs and off-set financial shortfalls. During CY23, the CH FP served 1,180 households; and, the FS served 9,556 shoppers, plus 2,959 special and vocation needs at \$23,869 direct cost. Base physical needs, such as food, undergarments, toiletries, clothing, and shoes, as well as survival blankets, hot hands and feet pads were given to our most vulnerable (i.e., homeless, low-to-moderate income) residents. CH does more than simply help with finances. Our counselor is an education resource and referral service for clients seeking aid. We listen to each unique situation and offer the most beneficial resources. Whether the resource is one of our programs or another agency's, no client leaves without the full support we can offer. Individual stability supports family stability which supports community stability.

This project is a 12-month, intensive career and resiliency accelerator program pilot in Monongalia County with small cohorts of SUD impacted young women, 18-24, focusing on foster and justice-impacted youth. Unemployment rates for young people aging out of foster care ranges from 47% - 69% (Source: The Economic Well-Being of Youth Transitioning From Foster Care (youthtoday.org)) and 25% of young adults who were released from incarceration by age 24 reported being unemployed after the the first year of their release (Source: How To Improve Employment Outcomes for Young Adults Leaving Incarceration - Center for American Progress). The accelerator would be open to young women or LGBTQ youth who are not currently pursuing any educational, training, or post-secondary programs; are unemployed or underemployed with income meeting eligibility threshold for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in West Virginia. Participants are required to engage in a minimum of 30 hours of productive work per week and will receive a \$13/hour needs-based stipend for up to 20 hours of productive work per week. Productive work includes attending a Libera group, completing Success Planning modules, working toward high school equivalency, applying to and interviewing for jobs, working a job, attending post-secondary educational or training courses, attending Libera professional development and social events, individual and group therapy sessions, meeting with their Libera mentor, and navigating resources related to basic needs and career opportunities. Participants will receive extensive wraparound services, including mental health counseling, support accessing and receiving resources related to housing, food insecurity, transportation, insurance, financial assistance, etc, weekly time spent with their 1:1 mentor, participation in Libera's professional development workshops with industry experts, and social events for connection.

The Norwood Hills Affordable Housing Project will construct two (2) single-family homes on Saxman Avenue, Morgantown, Monongalia County. Mon Valley Habitat is slated to begin construction on these three-bedroom, 2-bath homes in summer 2025 with completion within 12 months. The goal is to provide two (2) families from the Morgantown area with safe, affordable homes, increasing the number of homeownership opportunities for low- to moderate-income families. The population growth in Morgantown has far outpaced the state average, and the influx of residents has accelerated the deficit of affordable housing. Recent price escalation and interest rate increases have pushed affordable homeownership beyond the reach of many area residents. Families and individuals may apply for the Homeownership Program; participants for the program are selected based upon their housing need, ability to assume a 30-year, zero-percent interest mortgage and willingness to partner with Mon Valley Habitat for Humanity. This partnership includes 250 hours of "Sweat Equity" for everyone in the family who is 18 years-old and over; families meet this commitment by working on their home (or that of a neighbor's), completing homeownership and financial education courses and promoting the Homeownership Program to potential applicants. When construction is complete and the Partner Families have met all program requirements, they will purchase their home with a zero-percent interest mortgage and an affordable monthly payment, calculated on their ability to pay. Mon Valley Habitat for Humanity provides a hand up, not a handout, to those in need. We are building strength, stability and self-reliance through shelter.

Scott's Run Settlement House's (SRSH) Backpack Feeding Program provides food for the weekend to children who rely on school meals as their primary source of nutrition and experience food insecurity. Each week SRSH delivers bags containing two breakfast items, two lunch items, two dinner items, two snacks, and one fruit item to the schools who then distribute them to the children enrolled in the program. Beginning in 2011 with 100 children participating at one school, the program has grown to serve over 900 children at 14 schools. The benefits of this program are quite substantial. Surveys from both parents and teachers indicate a positive impact in the children's mental, emotional, and physical health in addition to improved academic performance. Specifically, 78% of parents reported an improvement in their child's overall mood and behavior while 72% of teachers reported improved attention in class. The additional nourishment the program provides allows children to develop properly and decreases the stress associated with childhood food insecurity. The cost of this program is roughly \$150 per child, per school year. This reflects food costs alone and does not include transportation or staff expenses. For the 2024 - 2025 school year, SRSH's food cost will be approximately \$135,000. Additional funding will not only allow SRSH to continue to provide for hundreds of children in need, but it will also allow healthier foods to be purchased. With your support our program will continue to evolve and expand to ensure no child goes hungry.

The West Virginia Fund for Law in the Public Interest's summer project sends current West Virginia University College of Law students into the field to serve the unmet legal needs of the poor. Our postgraduate project does the same, but with graduating students who will serve as full-time lawyers. These students and graduates address the legal needs of the poor by working in non-profit organizations throughout West Virginia that serve low-income clients in the areas of housing law, disability rights, family law, consumer law, and domestic violence. In 2025, our summer project will fund at least 15 law students; these students will each work full-time for 10 weeks. Our post-graduate fellowship program will fund two law graduates; each fellow will work full-time for one year. Since the WV Fund's inception in 1987, our fellows—each of whom has completed a competitive selection process—have provided thousands of their fellow West Virginia citizens with the free legal help that they so desperately need. Specifically, the WV Fund has funded over 560 summer fellows who have served low income clients, primarily in civil legal aid offices. Since 2008, the WV Fund has funded 28 full-time, postgraduate fellows who have also served low-income West Virginians with complex legal needs. Their work helps their clients escape domestic violence, retain safe housing, protect their children, and obtain relief from fraudulent consumer debt collection practices. Summer fellows and post-graduate fellows serve clients by providing them with direct legal representation, by giving them legal advice and information, by referring them to needed resources, by conducting legal research on their behalf, and by creating written informational pieces designed to educate them about their rights and options. Our student fellows work under the supervision of licensed attorneys. Our post-graduate fellows begin work once they have passed the bar exam and become licensed attorneys.

The Helpful Harvest Program was implemented in May of 2020 to address the increased need in food insecurity in Monongalia and Preston counties. In addition to addressing food insecurity, the program has an impact on employee retention and job creation for people with disabilities and has assisted individuals in recovery and our veterans. The program also disrupts entrenched norms of food pantries providing unhealthy, nutritionally insufficient foods to those in need because of the food's affordability and availability. By providing healthy food options to pantries and feeding programs, we are not only addressing the immediate needs of those experiencing food insecurity, but also helping to address the long-term health issues faced by our communities. The Injury Prevention and Safety Program at WVU Medicine Children's is committed to improving the health and safety of children across West Virginia. Unintentional injuries are the leading cause of death and disability of children in the United States, and most are predictable and preventable. Education, age-appropriate safety items, and home safety modifications are proven to reduce injuries and deaths, but many West Virginia families are not able to afford these measures. Our program is a statewide initiative which provides resources and support to families, both in the hospital and community, aiming to support families with incomes less than 125% below federal poverty level. These families come from every county in our state including the 18 counties identified by the Appalachian Regional Commission as distressed or at risk in FY2024. (County Economic Status in WV FY2024; arc.gov) Services are provided to families in the hospital after a baby is born or when a child is admitted with an unintentional injury, during community events like baby fairs and car seat checks, or when a community partner requests assistance. Our program also targets childcare centers, parenting groups, foster care agencies, schools, and clinics to help improve outreach and accessibility throughout West Virginia. Education is provided on safe car seat use and installation, safe sleep, shaken baby prevention, neonatal abstinence syndrome, and home childproofing to prevent injury. Age-appropriate child safety items, such as car seats, booster seats, pack & plays, specialty car seats, medication lock boxes, and home safety kits are provided to families meeting low-income guidelines. Our Injury Prevention and Safety team is comprised of two National Child Passenger Safety Technicians and one Registered Nurse who follow best practice to help keep children safe and serve as a resource across the state.

Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa) will use Neighborhood Investment Program tax credits to raise funds in support of its emergency assistance and food pantry programs. The emergency assistance program provides financial support to income eligible clients facing eviction or utility service termination. Assistance may also include financial help to fill prescriptions; provide gas for transportation to medical appointments or job interviews; or for alternate sources of heating like firewood, kerosene oil and propane. Income eligibility is defined as households whose income falls at or below 150% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. CCWVa's food pantry programs provide participants a multiple-day supply of food on a monthly basis. Pantry patrons are offered healthy options, and select the items included in their food order. The pantries primarily serve households with incomes at or below 150% of federal poverty guidelines. However, no one is turned away. CCWVa will pilot the Supporting Wellness at Pantries (SWAP) food ranking system in two locations to inform pantry patrons about nutrition and to help prevent chronic health conditions. Faith in Action is the only agency in the area providing no-cost transportation services. The volunteer match program provides free, caregiver services to support the independent living of low-income older adults and individuals with disabilities residing in Marshall, and Ohio Counties. Volunteer caregivers provide services, not covered by insurance and are not within the care receiver's budget. Frequently, we see our elderly and individuals with disabilities fall through the cracks; the money needed to pay bills (medical and utilities, food and medicine) overshadow the costs associated with transportation to doctor's appointments or grocery shopping and many do not have family or friends available to help. The program provides support and services that help older adults and individuals with disabilities remain independent. Transportation is crucial to ensure access to essential services such as medical care and grocery shopping. The availability of adequate transportation enables older adults and individuals with disabilities live independently in their communities and helps to prevent isolation and the possible need for long-term care placement. For many it is necessary to find community resources for transportation, as this vital support service may be their only connection to the outside world. FIAC provides a network of volunteers who offer flexible transportation for shopping, doctors' appointments, recreation, and other activities. One-way, round-trip, and multi-stop rides are available. The program provides door through-door service, offering personal, hands-on assistance by helping passengers through the doors of their residences and to their destinations. The service includes levels of assistance from opening doors and providing verbal guidance, to physical support. The strength of the program lies in the residents of the community; volunteer caregivers come together from all neighborhoods to help their neighbors throughout Marshall and Ohio Counties.

The Greater Wheeling Coalition for the Homeless (Coalition) proposes a Workforce Stability program to address funding gaps for critical positions essential to the organization's daily operations and for administrative expenses. As a primarily grant-funded organization, support for personnel carrying out administrative duties and for administrative expenses are historically subjected to funding constraints of 10% or less of total grant awards. The Coalition has historically maintained low administrative costs by developing hybrid positions that carry out both programmatic and administrative functions and by leveraging support from community volunteers; however, the organization continues to witness funding gaps to adequately support the administrative responsibilities of designated personnel. By investing in administrative infrastructure, the Neighborhood Investment Program will assist the Coalition in achieving the goals of its mission.

One in ten children in West Virginia will be a victim of sexual abuse by their 18th birthday. Traditionally, after making an abuse allegation, children are moved from agency to agency and endure multiple interviews, which create additional trauma of having to retell the circumstances of the abuse over and over. Harmony House is a Children's Advocacy Center (CAC), and our project is to provide a comprehensive, child-focused program based in a facility, a CAC, that allows prosecutors, law enforcement, child protection services staff, medical & mental health professionals, and victim advocates to work together to strengthen Ohio and Marshall counties response to child abuse. The project is to ensure that no child is further victimized by systems designed to protect them and their well-being is the first priority. To accomplish this, Harmony House CAC provides the following services to those children and their families that come through our door: forensic interviews provided by staff trained in ChildFirst; therapeutic intervention (on-site and through referrals), victim support and advocacy (crisis intervention, supportive counseling, case management, community resource information), case review and case tracking through a multidisciplinary team approach. The services provided by this project are at no cost to the children and families.

Since 1995, West Virginia has shown a steady incline in the cases of adult diabetes and obesity. Currently, the State is ranked #1 in the Country for adult obesity and #6 for child obesity in low-income children between 2 - 4 years old (http://stateofobesity.org/states/wv/). To prevent that number from rising, nutrition education is important in a young child's life. We continue to use a variety of ways to teach and promote healthy eating at the Center. Our outdoor garden provides the Center with tomatoes, peppers, squash and cucumbers. The Center follows the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and continues to be part of Keys 4 Healthy Kids, a program which provides tools and resources on proper nutrition for the children, staff and the families we serve. This program also teaches the staff how to implement changes and encourage children to try new foods. We continue to keep processed foods to a minimum, offer fresh fruits and fresh vegetables at meals, and encourage children to drink more water to stay hydrated. Tax credits awarded will continue these efforts, educate children on the benefits of healthy eating habits, and provide healthy meals for the children.

The LIFE HUB nonprofit, located in Wheeling, West Virginia, compassionately serves adults who are homeless and in need of a low-barrier shelter. The LIFE HUB works with community partners and existing agencies to coordinate social services, permanent housing, employment, education, as well as mental and physical healthcare in one safe place. The Upper Ohio Valley has been blessed with several social service agencies and faith-based organizations dedicated to providing resources within their mission to assist the poor and homeless. The LIFE HUB serves with partnering agencies as the conduit to coordinate the efforts into a whole community approach. The LIFE HUB was created as a 501c3 nonprofit organization in October 2022 and purchased The First English Lutheran Church in downtown Wheeling in May of 2023 to serve as the low-barrier shelter. In its second year, the LIFE HUB will operate a six-month shelter from November through April with continued stakeholder support and funding from WVDHHR. In addition to the shelter services and collaborating with area social service agencies, the LIFE HUB also focuses on advocacy, prevention, and crisis care coordination. During the past year, the LIFE HUB served 360 unduplicated individuals in the low-barrier shelter and an additional 40 individuals and families in need of crisis care coordination such as rental assistance, utility assistance, hotel stays, and transportation to prevent homelessness.

Access to the Parks offers each and every low-income child in Ohio County (WV), along with an accompanying parent, free admission to activities at Oglebay and Wheeling Park year around, where they can reap the physical, mental, educational and social benefits of spending time outdoors in the parks. Included are all recreational and educational options (including related equipment) such as swimming, golf and miniature golf, tennis, boating, fishing, ice skating, skiing, and visits to the zoo, museums and nature education center. Interested families register and receive passes valid for one year. Without "Access," many low-income children would not have the chance to engage in these healthy, social and mentally stimulating activities due to their families' inability to pay. We have two youth emergency shelters (ages 8-17) and a Transitional Living Program (TLP) for youth aging out of foster care or experiencing homelessness (ages 17-21). YSS also provided services to homeless and street youth in the community. In FY 2023, YSS served 60 youth in our emergency shelters, 96 in Transitional Living Program and 37 in our recovery homes. This year we have increased our staff in both emergency shelters, we continue to expand our TLP program in our community and are looking to increase the number of beds for youth in need of emergency shelters. Individuals who are unhoused and out in the elements have basic needs which need to be met. YSS reduces their vulnerability and improves their quality of life. Staff and community partners help to track down birth certificates, help navigate the service providers for first month's rent or help to secure a month's rent to keep families from becoming homeless, assist with furnishings through our Sophie Moses Free Store and stocking their pantry with basic food from our food pantry. Finally, for people in recovery from substance use disorder who need housing, YSS offers housing in one of our three recovery homes. Clients live among peers and work together on their education and/or employment and recovery. The community supports YSS through the donations, volunteers (including our Board of Directors and Emeritus Board), participation in our fundraising efforts providing material needs- clothing, blankets, house hold items, shoes and toiletries, among other items.

Admission is open to rising 8th through 12th-grade girls in our service area and girls from other youth programs in the region. Camp is free for girls within our home service area. We run a college access and a student leadership program during the school year. These programs include one-on-one mentoring, tutoring, college trips, service-learning overnights, enrichment events, community outreach, leadership roles, and advocacy. High Rocks coordinates multiple opportunities for students to speak with their representatives in the state legislature and partner with other organizations as opportunities arise to teach relevant topics in their communities. Our participants are encouraged to expand their horizons and challenge themselves, enabling them to realize that they are brighter, stronger, braver, and can achieve more than they thought possible.

Older students will serve as junior-counselors, mentoring the younger students. This encourages their leadership skills and promotes drug prevention for both groups. Both the summer and after-school programs provide healthy snacks for all participants.

We know that a disproportionate percentage of foster youth struggle to finish high school, much less move on to vocational schooling or college. Relying heavily on this belief that education is life changing, Mission West Virginia is serving students in the foster/kinship care system with an evidenced-based programing through a program called, the Bridge. The Bridge strives to create opportunities and support West Virginia children that have experienced a crisis of parenting to pursue their dreams and become productive members of our community. We seek to accomplish this mission by serving high school settings in rural Appalachia in out-of-home care by collaborating with county school systems. Through intentional collaboration with schools, caretakers, and community organizations, we are able to help meet the students' needs and remove barriers to school success. We use an evidence-based mentoring intervention for students who show warning signs of disengagement with school and who are at risk of dropping out. At the core of this model is a trusting relationship between the student and a caring mentor who-• Builds a strong relationship with students based on mutual trust and open communication. • Systematically "Checks" on students, assessing their engagement with school and learning through close monitoring of their attendance, behavior, and grades. • "Connects" with students, offering individualized intervention. • Partners with parents/families, functioning as a liaison. Since the inception of the Bridge program in 2016, participants have consistently shown remarkable results. One hundred percent of high school seniors in the program have successfully graduated, with ninety-nine percent of them pursuing meaningful post-secondary education and career plans. Year after year, we have witnessed improved outcomes in attendance, behavior, and grades among all participants.

Now on staff, Scott is successfully pouring his life back into residents as they come through the program and encouraging other graduates in their sobriety. His family rejoices in who he is and his service and heart for others. In 2025, Hospice of Southern West Virginia will hold the 12th annual Camp Hope. This children's bereavement camp is expected to serve 40 children in a secure and nurturing atmosphere with activities led by licensed professionals. Recognizing that each child's personal loss is unique, the camp staff provides a safe environment where grieving children receive comfort and support to facilitate the healing process. They form lasting friendships and enjoy activities that encourage them to be kids. Camp is scheduled to last 3 days and will be held at a location that offers an array of activities in addition to the therapeutic exercises. Participants will receive engagement opportunities such as storytelling, arts, journaling, group discussions, and interactive group exercises such as solutions basket, yarn-web, and "what helps/what hurts." Camp Hope offers children who have experienced the loss of a loved one the opportunity to understand both the individualistic nature of grief and to connect with peers who are also working through loss. Attendees are able to express their grief in a safe, non-judgmental environment, focusing on their own unique healing process rather than being told how they should grieve. Camp Hope uses engagement techniques coupled with best practice models to support children. This program directly affects the lives of hurting young people in a positive way. In addition to deaths from aging or disease, Southern WV counties have been ravaged by loss from the opioid epidemic, with WV still leading the nation in rates of unintentional overdose deaths. The need for bereavement services in our four-county service area is critical. True to its name, Camp Hope gives hope in terms of positivity and mental health support for children; the program is a positive step away from the ingrained practice of false bravado and neglecting self. Camp Hope acknowledges that grief is a difficult process of the human condition, but healing is possible.

Just for Kids, Inc. is a child advocacy center that serves both Raleigh and Fayette Counties in WV. We provide trauma-informed, victim centered and developmentally appropriate services to victims of child abuse and child witnesses to violent crimes. Just for Kids, Inc. coordinates the investigative efforts of child protection services, law enforcement, advocates, medical professionals, and mental health clinicians under one roof. Our staff conduct forensic interviews, provide family advocacy and crisis intervention, trauma informed therapy, and ensures appropriate medical treatment and evidence collection when necessary. What we know is that children in Raleigh and Fayette Counties are at a much higher risk of familial trafficking due to our rural location, the susceptibility of our community members falling prey to the opioid epidemic, and the limited resources that are designed for child sexual exploitation and abuse interdiction. In addition to providing services to children who experienced maltreatment, JFK is intending on expanding our scope to include better identifying and supporting child sex trafficking victims. As we have seen over the last few years, our services are vital to this community. We currently only have one therapist that serves both counties; we have outdated equipment, our abilities to improve access to professional development (including addressing vicarious and secondary trauma) has been limited and an overall need for expansion as well as need to focus on improving our ability to provide a more trauma informed space have all been recognized. Having access to these funds would provide us the opportunity to address those issues that are not covered by other funding sources.

The College was founded in 1904 to create access to education for the citizens of Elkins, WV and the rural Appalachian region surrounding it. In keeping with that tradition, the Highlands Scholar Program debuted in 2009 to make private higher education affordable to students in surrounding counties by providing scholarships to students who have a minimum 2.5 GPA. This segment of the program's original 7-county region comprises the current Highlands Scholars Regional Program. These low-income students are often 1st-generation high school graduates and 1st-generation college students, and this program ensures them access to a private college within their home state at a reasonable tuition rate. Average awards are \$19,000 for residential students and \$16,000 for commuting students (\$76,000 / \$64,000 for four years respectively), making the dream of a college degree accessible and affordable. To date D&E has invested over \$45.1 million in 2,263 Highlands Scholar recipients. Last year, 162 enrolled from this 7-county region, and this year to date 134 are enrolled, with more enrolling almost daily. At D&E students find small classes and a nurturing community, increasing their likelihood of academic and personal success. D&E believes that while a college education provides value for a lifetime, students shouldn't have to spend a lifetime paying for it. With the Highlands Scholar Regional Program, D&E provides deserving low-income students in the local region with an opportunity to receive a quality, private education at an affordable price close to home. Since 1992, the Upshur Cooperative Parish House has served our Upshur County "neighbors" (clients) by providing basic necessities (food, shelter, clothing, warmth) in times of need. For our NIP project this year, we propose expanding some of our existing critical needs programs while offering new programs to address impoverished youth. In 2023, we provided 919 Upshur County students with backpacks containing school supplies and hygiene items to start the new year. With the failure of our county's Excess Levy in May, we anticipate an increase of 25% for this program. Additionally, we started a Weekend Food Program after our county abruptly ended their weekend backpack program last fall. During the 2023/24 school year, we contributed food packages for 450 food insecure students each week. NIP funding would be used to solidify and expand these growing programs. We are also focusing on new programming to support ALICE families - those that are Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed. By targeting healthy eating initiatives to families with single mothers, we hope to influence lifelong eating habits for children and provide an opportunity for families to build social support networks. In 2023, our pantry saw a 38% increase in demand. If current trends hold, we will provide an additional 1,000 meal packages in 2024. While our pantry is well supported, additional pantry services (e.g. cleaning supplies, hygiene items, etc.) are not as consistent. Through NIP funding, we would like to prepare 300 packages of cleaning supplies per month to encourage safe, healthy lifestyles. The Holiday Meal program adds an extra layer of food security at critical times when many low income families face financial strain. Meal packages include a main course protein, multiple side dishes and vegetables, and a dessert that can be prepared at home with basic cooking supplies. By offering these meals, we give families the opportunity and peace-of-mind to celebrate the holidays with dignity.

The girls have been taken out of their homes and brought to us to live, grow and heal. Unfortunately, funding for recreational activities is not available for our girls. Research shows that girls who have been victimized (especially sexually) show an increase in positive behaviors due to a variety of recreational activities for them to engage in. It is increasingly expensive, especially with the current national inflation, for 24 girls to have throughout the year and the availability of volunteers and donor designations for this program are slim. The recreational activities include membership to the local YMCA, specialized trauma stretching with moves that increase self-esteem and confidence, an annual camping trip which includes wildlife educational activities and cultural arts enrichment. The variety of activities along with the extra staff cost to oversee these activities are a necessity. The girls that come to live at Golden Girl Group Home are traumatized and come from poverty stricken homes. The stipend received per day to cover the cost of living for the girls to be at Golden Girl does not include resources to provide for recreational activities. The combination of poverty and abuse creates such a bondage within the hearts of the girls that is shows in their behaviors and all aspects of their lives. Consistency and a variety of fun, rewarding and educational activities sifnificantly helps in the healing process and produces more positive behaviors. According to "The Journal of Abnormal Psychology" children especially adolescents that have Post Traumatic Stress Disorder caused by abuse and neglect benefit tremendously from consistent "fun" and "diverse" recreational activities.

Habitat for Humanity of the Mid-Ohio Valley builds homes in partnership with those in need of affordable, permanent housing. Homebuyers partner with our organization by agreeing to work on their and other Habitat homes, take homeowner readiness courses, and repay an interest-free mortgage. Habitat homeowners work alongside community volunteers to build their home. Habitat MOV also administers a Minor Repair program low-income homeowners. Access to affordable housing is a challenge for many low-income families in our community. Housing that is available is oftentimes substandard. One in nine households in West Virginia are burdened by housing costs spending half or more of their income on housing (Habitat for Humanity International, 2022 State of Home Affordability in West Virginia). Habitat's affordable homeownership program is a solution to address the rising cost of housing in our communities. As part of this project, Habitat will construct two single family homes in Wood County. Both homes will be located in the City of Parkersburg. As a result of the projects, eight low-income individuals will move into safe, stable, affordable housing. In addition to building new homes, Habitat will also provide homebuyer education and home maintenance classes in order to prepare partner families for owning their home. We have added a new Minor Repair Program for low-income homeowners who need simple repairs to enable them to stay in their homes. To date, we have received over fifty requests for repairs like accessibility ramps, shower kits, and roof repairs. Our goal is to complete one project per month, with half of those being in Wood County, WV. Approximately 12 West Virginians will be impacted annually by these repairs, and will not be forced to move into less stable/affordable living situations.

Humane Society of Parkersburg will provide free spay/neuter procedure and a rabies vaccine (if not already vaccinated) to low income individuals. While we do not currently have a full-time staff veterinarian, we do have access to multiple relief veterinarians who come to our free-standing clinic and perform these procedures for the members of the general public. While our standard cost for the procedures is low, the cost can still be a barrier for some clients who would otherwise have their animals altered to help with pet overpopulation in our communities. This project will allow low income pet owners to receive these services by presenting an award letter, Medicare or Medicaid card or any other documentation indicating they are currently receiving one or more forms of government assistance. Appointments are required to ensure adequate staff resources are available to provide safe care for each of the animals being altered. Our goal is to provide these services to prevent unintentional litters of puppies or kittens that increase the number of pets the individuals have to provide care for or re-home.

The Parkersburg Art Center will recruit and engage local low-income senior citizens in low cost creative art activities. Twelve-session art classes will each enroll 12 students each. Art activities will also be offered at two locations away from the Art Center, which will engage 40 older adults. One hundred students will be enrolled in one of six daytime art classes. For these classes they will pay a nominal tuition. Students will receive instruction in watercolor, oil painting, and drawing. At the end of the year an exhibit of the work of these students will be held in the galleries of the Art Center. All of this activity is focused upon getting older individuals engaged in creative work with their peers. Participants will be engaged in activities that provide social contact for those who may be living alone in an isolated environment. Peer assistance and collaboration will be encouraged to help build a cohort of senior citizens who are interest in developing art skills and engaging in social activity.

House to Home recognizes that until clients meet these basic, day-to-day needs, they are unable to focus on other goals such as finding housing, employment or accessing other needed services and resources. Unlike most overnight shelters, House to Home is open during daytime hours and charges nothing for its services. By providing a place where clients can access resources during the day, clients are not forced to seek shelter in public spaces where they are typically unwelcome. We lift up, empower and serve members of our community by providing a hand up to thousands of residents in the Greater Parkersburg area through our food pantry, utility assistance, rental assistance and shelter programs. For many, making ends meet is a daily challenge. We offer emergency services of food, rental and mortgage assistance and utility assistance, as we look to meet our clients' physical and spiritual needs. While some clients receive assistance regularly, most simply need help getting through a hard time or crisis, and our program works to lessen their burden. Last year we served more than 2700 people for the first time. In addition to the social service programs we provide transitional housing to several families and our emergency shelter has more than 40 beds for men, women and families, and most months it is used to capacity. Women's Care Center is a free medical clinic in Parkersburg, WV since 1991. Women's Care Center became an accredited health care facility in 2021 under the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care (AAAHC). With the confidence of the AAAHC accreditation and the addition of a Nurse Practitioner on staff, we will be expanding our free medical services related to sexual risk awareness and prevention. We already provide testing for the three STIs and emphasize the importance of STI testing during our free pregnancy and ultrasound appointments. We will be adding to our services in three different ways: 1. We will be including the risks of STIs to all of our patient take home packets to further emphasize the importance of screening and treatment of STIs. 2. We will be adding a domestic violence (includes sexual violence) screening to every appointment with a licensed healthcare professional and working with our Family Crisis Intervention Center with those patients who score at risk on the tool. 3. We will be expanding the tests and the subsequent treatments we are providing (Medical Administration Subcommittee at WCC is working on evaluating the specific tests to be added). According to the CDC, from 2000 to 2022, there has been an increase of 2.5 million cases of the top three STIs in just those two years. Our patient population is among the most affected groups listed on the CDC website including adolescents from 15-24 and pregnant women. This Sexual Risk Awareness & Prevention Expansion is a project within the other free services of Women's Care Center which include pregnancy testing, ultrasound, mentoring, medical and social referrals, and baby supplies for the first year of life.
